PRESS TOWARD THE UPWARD CALL

In 1953, Tenzing Norgey and Sir Edmund Hillary did the unthinkable, the unimaginable and the impossible: they made it to the top of Mt. Everest.

Tenzing Norgey was always a climber – it was his lifestyle. He had climbed many other mountains, and even attempted to ascend Mt. Everest six times before. It takes a lot of time, effort and resources to attempt a climb of this nature. Can you imagine heading down the mountain after that sixth failed attempt?

Tenzing Norgey wasn't a quitter though, not even after six unsuccessful attempts up the mountain. He wasn't a camper either – he could have been content having set the record for highest altitude stepped upon by a human being. No climber had ever set foot higher up than he did until that point.

But he wasn't a camper either: he wasn't going to stay where he was. He was going to climb as high as he could.

In life there are three different types of people. There are quitters, there are campers, and there are climbers. Quitters give up and turn around. Campers are content with the level they are at. Climbers are never satisfied until they've reached the heights that God has called them to be at.

There is a zone above a certain altitude that climbers call "the death zone." It's where the body slowly dies until climbers can get back below. If they want to reach the peak though, they have to disregard everything else and "die to self" in order to get to the summit.

If we want to go higher in our relationship with God, we have to die to self as well. It takes sacrifice and reaching beyond our normal capabilities to elevate to the next level. So ask yourself this question as you look at the peak before you: are you a quitter, a camper or a climber?





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GO CLIMB A ROCK

Do you want to make it to the top? If so, there are three things all climbers do to get ready, things you can do as well.

First, be prepared. The distance between dreams and reality is called discipline. Climbers aren't going to make it to the top unless they have the discipline to train their bodies and their minds. In the same way, we can only reach those places God wants us to go if we have self-control, and a desire to train ourselves to become all He wants us to be. It takes sacrifice, and it can be quite a challenge. But once you start taking action, the Lord Himself will be with you for the climb. He'll be right there alongside you, every step of your journey.

Discipline is choosing between what you want now, and what you want most. He sees the effort you're taking in every step, and yes, He rewards those who earnestly seek Him.

The second thing to do is this: get acclimated. Climbers going up Mt. Everest are recommended to stay at the Everest Base Camp a few days first. You see, before you can go really high up to the tops of these mountains, you have to spend some time at a higher elevation, getting used to the atmosphere. What kind of atmosphere are you spending your time in? Is it something that can help you go higher?

The third thing is equally important: learn from your guide! Joshua stayed with Moses, going up the mountain, and not those content to be at the base. Following a lead climber will help you go further than ever. When we spend time around others, we tend to pick up their talents, abilities and habits. Are you learning from a leader who can help you climb to the peak?

It's a simple climbing route, but when you have discipline, when you're in the right atmosphere, and when you follow a good lead climber, you'll make it to the top. So what are you waiting for? Go climb a rock!

STAND TALL

You'd be hard pressed to find a more dramatic ascent of a mountain in the Old Testament than at the base of Mt. Carmel. Could you imagine the group of climbers that had assembled at the base of that mountain? Very soon at the top, there'd be an incredible showdown of epic proportions! It would be one that would determine who the nation of Israel would worship from that point on. Would it be the god Baal, or would it be the one true God?

If numbers of worshippers alone were to say anything, the answer should have been Baal. Elijah was one of the only prophets of God left standing, but nevertheless, he didn't "Baal" out on God. He stood his ground and challenged all the prophets of Baal to a showdown, and what a match it was.

Elijah knew there was a lot at stake. He knew others were watching, and that others would follow God too if only he would make a stand on Mt. Carmel. As you know, Elijah did make that stand on Mt. Carmel, and God showed up at the peak of the mountain, big time. Flames dropped down from the skies and consumed his offering, and when the people saw this, they fell down and cried, "The Lord – He is God!"

We don't put our lives at stake every single day, but we do find ourselves in a position frequently where we have to make a stand. When those times come, it's important to show courage and do the right thing, because others are watching. There's a lot on the line, but God is a rewarder of those who diligently climb higher to seek Him.



STAND TALL

"Now send for people from all over Israel. Tell them to meet me on Mount Carmel. And bring the 450 prophets of the god Baal. Also bring the 400 prophets of the goddess Asherah. All of them eat at Jezebel's table."

So Ahab sent that message all through Israel. He gathered the prophets together on Mount Carmel.

Elijah went there and stood in front of the people. He said, "How long will it take you to make up your minds? If the Lord is the one and only God, follow Him. But if Baal is the one and only God, follow him."

The people didn't say anything.

Then Elijah said to them, "I'm the only one of the Lord's prophets left. But Baal has 450 prophets. ... pray to your god. And I'll pray to the Lord. The god who answers by sending fire down is the one and only God."

Then all of the people said, "What you are saying is good." Elijah spoke to the prophets of Baal. He said, "Pray to your god. But don't light the fire." They prayed to Baal from morning until noon. "Baal! Answer us!" they shouted. But there wasn't any reply. No one answered. Then they danced around the altar they had made.

At noon Elijah began to tease them. "Shout louder!" he said. "I'm sure Baal is a god! Perhaps he has too much to think about. Or maybe he has gone to the toilet. Or perhaps he's away on a trip. Maybe he's sleeping. You might have to wake him up."

Then he said to some of the people, "Fill four large jars with water. Pour it on the offering and the wood." So they did.

"Do it again," he said. So they did it again.

"Do it a third time," he ordered. And they did it the third time. The water ran down around the altar. It even filled the ditch.

When it was time to offer the evening sacrifice, the prophet Elijah stepped forward. He prayed, "Lord, you are the God of Abraham, Isaac and Israel. Today let everyone know that you are God in Israel. Let them know I'm your servant. Let them know I've done all of these things because you commanded me to. Answer me. Lord, answer me. Then these people will know that you are the one and only God. They'll know that you are turning their hearts back to you again."

The fire of the Lord came down. It burned up the sacrifice. It burned up the wood and the stones and the soil. It even licked up the water in the ditch.

GOD WILL PROVIDE

At the top of the mountain, everything changes. Abraham's life completely turned around the day he was told to climb Mount Moriah with his son, Isaac. It was the ultimate test for Abraham, as he was asked to do something dramatic: sacrifice his only son. Fortunately, God had a plan. Once He saw Abraham's obedience, He provided a substitute for the sacrifice, sparing Isaac's life. God is Jehovah Jireh, our Provider. In fact, from that point on, everyone said, "It will be provided on the mountain of the Lord."

Many years later, King David would find himself on top of this very mountain, pleading for God to forgive him. He was told to build an altar to the Lord, and it was here that David found forgiveness. He decided to build a temple for God right there upon Mount Moriah, where sacrifices would be made to cover for the sins of the people. King David's son Solomon completed the temple, and for many years it stood on top of the mountain, a place of forgiveness.

But forgiveness always came with a price – and sacrifice. Our sins could never be completely washed clean, and there was no one to stand in the gap for us. That is, until something else happened that shook this very mountain and sent tremors throughout history: Jesus, the perfect Son of God, came to earth. He would go to this very mountain, and it was there that he would offer himself as a substitute, taking our place.

Isaiah prophesied that, "He took the sins of many people on himself. And he gave his life for those who had done what is wrong." He did not have to do this, of course. We could have been left to the punishment we deserved. But "God loved the world so much that He gave His one and only Son."

On Mount Moriah, Abraham had found a substitute. On Mount Moriah, King David found forgiveness. On Mount Moriah, all of us found both: we found a savior. It was provided on the mountain of the Lord.



GOD WILL PROVIDE

Then God said, "Take your son, your only son. He is the one you love. Take Isaac. Go to Moriah. Give him to me there as a burnt offering. Sacrifice him on one of the mountains I will tell you about."

Early the next morning Abraham got up. He put a saddle on his donkey. He took two of his servants and his son Isaac with him. He cut enough wood for the burnt offering. Then he started out for the place God had told him about.

On the third day Abraham looked up. He saw the place a long way off. He said to his servants, "Stay here with the donkey. The boy and I will go over there and worship. Then we'll come back to you."

Abraham put the wood for the burnt offering on his son Isaac. He himself carried the fire and the knife. The two of them walked on together.


Then Isaac spoke up. He said to his father Abraham, "Father?" "Yes, my son?" Abraham replied. "The fire and wood are here," Isaac said. "But where is the lamb for the burnt offering?" Abraham answered, "God Himself will provide the lamb for the burnt offering, my son." The two of them walked on together. They reached the place God had told Abraham about. There Abraham built an altar. He arranged the wood on it. He tied up his son Isaac. He placed him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then he reached out his hand. He took the knife to kill his son.

LOVE WHITE AS SNOW

Mont Blanc stands tall, the highest peak in the Alps, one of the highest peaks in Europe. Its top is completely covered in snow and ice, all year round. In fact, that's what the peak's name actually means: "White Mountain." At 15,774 feet tall, this mountain is a great site for hikers, skiers, and snowboarders too. In fact, the first Winter Olympic Games ever were held at the foot of this mountain in 1924.

In all its history, this peak has always remained covered in snow, and always a brilliant white. The beautiful ice and white powder has covered all traces of rock and dirt, making Mont Blanc one of the most majestic things you can see.

Snow helps make things more beautiful, doesn't it? Perhaps that's why the Lord used it in a famous scripture from the Bible. Isaiah 1:18 tells us, "Come. Let us settle this matter," says the Lord. "Even though your sins are bright red, they will be as white as snow."

Though your sins may be pretty awful to look at, when we ask forgiveness and repent, the Lord has it covered, literally! It's as if your ugly past deeds have been covered in a blanket of white snow. The history of it is still there beneath the layers of white snow, but God has promised to forget about it. And because of Jesus, all our sins are covered by His sacrifice. Indeed, they will be white as snow!

GET A GRIP!

At the rooftop of the world, climbers have to be very careful not to fall. The air is thinner, and it becomes harder to focus – and that's why a climber has to be trained to avoid mistakes that could cause a disaster.

A climber faces one of the biggest challenges with each step. One slip and you could find yourself sliding down the broad slope of the mountain, and to certain doom. Even worse, you could be dragging others down too. The best way to avoid this, and ascend with care, is to keep on the straight and narrow path up the slope. If you find yourself in this situation and starting to slide – get a grip!

There are things you need to hold tightly to. For example, one way climbers avoid trouble is holding tightly to one another. Tether yourself to a climbing buddy. By firmly attaching themselves to each other, climbers can help each other quickly if one starts to slip. The ascent will be much easier when you help each other through the tough spots.

Sir Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay were the first to reach the top of Mount Everest, but nobody knows which one of the two actually stepped foot on the peak of the mountain first. This is because they reached the top *as a team*. And similarly, that's how God sees us working together. We can only reach the highest of heights *together*.

Of course, the best thing to hold tightly to is our Heavenly Father. If you feel things off balance, do what all climbers do: get a grip. Hold on tightly to God, our Rock. He won't let you fall.

You can and will make it up the mountain, with determination, careful footing, and a good buddy system. If you want to enjoy the view from the top, be safe and careful – and get a grip!

LOOK TO THE MOUNTAINS

In the Bible, there's one guy who just had to be a climber. His name was Caleb, and as he went into the Promised Land, he had one thing he wanted. He told Joshua, "Give me this mountain!"

Of course, this was easier said than done. There were large warriors still living on that mountain. There were battles that needed to be won. But Caleb said if the Lord was with him, he would drive everyone out. That mountain would be his.

And it was. Caleb was an older guy, and this might have come as a surprise to some. But anyone who knew Caleb's faith probably felt differently. You see, years before, Caleb was one of the only people who believed God when he was told the Israelites could take the Promised Land. Are you facing a mountain-sized challenge in your life? Read this scripture below, and see how two different people reacted to that sort of situation:

"So Ahab went off to eat and drink. But Elijah climbed to the top of Mount Carmel. He bent down toward the ground. Then he put his face between his knees." 1 Kings 18:42 NIRV

While King Ahab was eating and drinking, Elijah climbed a mountain. While the king was eating and drinking, Elijah was not. Instead, he was climbing – and praying. It's not the only time in the Bible this happens:

"On one of those days, Jesus went out to a mountainside to pray. He spent the night praying to God." Luke 6:12 NIRV

Jesus spent a lot of time on top of mountains, a place where he did a lot of praying. It was a custom of his, and not a bad one. He did it frequently:

"After he had sent them away, he went up on a mountainside by himself to pray. Later that night, he was there alone." Matthew 14:23 NIRV

To be clear: it's not that climbing a mountain gets you closer to God. What was so effective was this: getting away from it all, long enough to spend some time alone with God.

Prayer is an important part of our lives as Christians, a time we need to spend talking with our Heavenly Father. If you're missing out on that, you're missing out on a lot.

You don't have to climb a mountain, but make a promise now to spend more time in prayer than ever before. It's a good habit. And... it's a powerful one.

"What I'm about to tell you is true. If you have faith as small as a mustard seed, it is enough. You can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there.' And it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you." Matthew 17:20 NIRV
